



The book of Esther







- One of only two Bible books named for women, many including Luther and Calvin have questioned why this book is in the Bible.
- After all:
 - It doesn't mention God
 - It doesn't predict the Messiah
 - It doesn't mention faith or worship
 - It doesn't mention anything "religious"
 - There's no uplifting "moral of the story"

Underlying Concepts

 Esther – the book of something hidden (Book of Esther)



 Purim – the casting of lots – "The lot is cast into the lap; but the whole disposing thereof is of the LORD." (Proverb 16:33)




 The Law of the Medes and the Persians, a royal decree cannot be changed. (Daniel 6:8)

- Ancient Everlasting Hatred (Ezekiel 35:5-7)




עוֹלָם אֵיבָת - Haman's Genealogy



- Amalek fought with Israel at Rephidim (Ex 17:8-16).
- Amalekites attacked rear of marching Israelites in the Exodus (Deut 25:17-19).
- "YHWH will have war with Amalek from generation to generation" (Ex 17:14-18).
- Samuel ordered Saul to "go and smite Amalek, and utterly destroy all that they have, and spare them not." (1 Sam 15:1-3).
- Saul spared Amalekite king Agag, so God took the kingdom from him. (1 Sam 5:7-28)
- Samuel killed Agag but some Agagites escaped. In fact, an Amalekite claimed to have killed Saul in battle. (2 Sam 1:1-10)

Saul's **disobedience** to God spared Agag resulting in Haman.

עוֹלְם אֵיבְת - Mordecai's Genealogy



- As David fled from Absalom Shimei ran along the ridge overlooking the road, cursing, throwing stones at him, and saying, "Come out, come out, thou bloody man and thou man of Belial the Lord hath returned upon thee all the blood of the house of Saul and the Lord hath delivered the kingdom into the hand of Absalom thy son, and behold thou art taken in thy mischief because thou art a bloody man" (2 Sam 16:5-13). Abishai would have "taken off his head" then and there but David let him live.
- When David became king, Shimei met him with a thousand Benjamites, and begged David to spare him. Abishai would again have slain Shimei, but David on his day of restoration to the kingdom said "thou shalt not die."

David showing Shimei **mercy** led to Mordecai and Esther.





Mordecai overhead a plot and told Esther who told Xerxes.





The plotters were executed and the incident forgotten.




Esther won favour with the king and invited the king and Haman to wine and dessert. There, she invited them to a feast the next day.







Esther 6 – Just Deserts



- So one was commanded to bring the book of the records of the chronicles; and they were read before the king.
- And it was found written that Mordecai had told of Bigthana and Teresh, two of the king's eunuchs, the doorkeepers who had sought to lay hands on King Ahasuerus.



Then the king said, "What honor or dignity has been bestowed on Mordecai for this?"

And the king's servants who attended him said, "Nothing has been done for him."





- So the king said, "Who is in the court?"
 Now Haman had just entered the outer court of the king's palace to suggest that the king hang Mordecai on the gallows that he had prepared for him.
- The king's servants said to him, "Haman is there, standing in the court." And the king said, "Let him come in."
- So Haman came in, and the king asked him, "What shall be done for the man whom the king delights to honor?"

Now Haman thought in his heart, "Whom would the king delight to honor more than me?" ⁷ And Haman answered the king, "For the man whom the king



delights to honor, 8 let a royal robe be brought which the king has worn, and a horse on which the king has ridden, which has a royal crest placed on its head. ⁹ Then let this robe and horse be delivered to the hand of one of the king's most noble princes, that he may array the man whom the king delights to honor. Then parade him on horseback through the city square, and proclaim before him: 'Thus shall it be done to the man whom the king delights to honor!" "

¹⁰ Then the king said to Haman. "Hurry, take the robe and the horse, as you have suggested, and do so for Mordecai the Jew who sits within the king's gate!

Leave nothing undone of all that you have spoken."


11 So Haman took the robe and the horse, arrayed Mordecai and led him on horseback through the city square, and proclaimed before him,

"THUS SHALL IT BE DONE TO THE MAN WHOM THE KING DELIGHTS TO HONOR!"



Afterward Mordecai went back to the king's gate.
But Haman hurried to his house, mourning and with his head covered.

¹³ When Haman told his wife Zeresh and all his friends everything that had happened to him, his wise men and his wife Zeresh said to him. "If Mordecai, before whom you have begun to fall, is of Jewish descent, you will not prevail against him but will surely fall before him."


Esther 7 – Haman's Comeuppance




- ³ Then Queen Esther answered and said, "If I have found favor in your sight, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me at my petition, and my people at my request.







As the word left the king's mouth, they covered Haman's face.

Then the king said, "Hang him on it!"






10 So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the king's wrath subsided.
